
In 2020 the MPRG exhibition With a little help from our Friends showcased 34 works the Friends of MPRG had purchased for the Gallery since 1996.

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Poetry at the Rose Garden





THE Friends of the MPRG hosted an October evening of poetry readings at the Mornington Botanical Rose Garden.

Castlemaine poets Ann de Hugard and Rob Wallis presented very autobiographical anecdotes from their lives.

Ann called her excerpts poetry of the human world and featured the life of a German relative, T. (Theo) Scharf from his young days in Munich, 1923 through to later visits to Australia. Theo died in 1987 and his last work was a delightful illustrated children's pull out book: 'Bächlein auf der Reise' (the journey of the river) a parable of his life. Rob Wallis details in his sonnets and poems, often funny, irreverent but sad, his perceptive view of people and their choice of lifestyles. Both poets gave us strong, poignant topics to ponder and a relevant look at the world today. Thanks to Neil Chapple for serenading us with his saxophone melodies; wine and finger food well received so a successful evening enjoyed by all.




