We had 30 attend the meeting so the committee will require a much greater attendance next year.

t was a pleasure to welcome Janelle McCulloch to the gallery in July to share information about the life of Joan Lindsay, author of Picnic at Hanging Rock.

Joan loved gardening Australian bush. From an early age she enjoyed family picnics at Hanging Rock and was fascinated by the history of the area and its unique beauty. It inspired her to write the well known Australian classic, Picnic at Hanging Rock in 1967. Her memory of family picnics and the rugged rock formations were the basis of her story about three young girls and a teacher who go missing on a school trip to Hanging Rock.


